**Resolution Supporting Barron County Policy on Taxpayer-Funded Incentives for  
Vaccinations**

**TO THE BARRON COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:**

**WHEREAS**, Barron County Public Health partnered with another government agency who provided \$100 gift cards to Barron County residents who received a COVID vaccination or booster at a vaccine clinic held by Barron County Public Health on Friday, December 9, 2022; and

**WHEREAS**, it was confirmed that these \$100 gift cards (200+) were purchased with taxpayer money from a federal grant; and

**WHEREAS**, Barron County residents have expressed concern about their tax money being used to incentivize vaccines; and

**WHEREAS**, Barron County supervisors are accountable to the public for how their tax money is spent in Barron County; and

**WHEREAS**, this resolution was approved by the Health & Human Services Board on \_\_\_, 2023, on a vote of \_\_\_, with \_\_\_ voting in favor and \_\_\_ against.

#### ***Program Operations***

Wisconsin's Child Support Program is coordinated by the Wisconsin Department of Children and Families (DCF), which contracts with 71 county child support agencies to administer the program on a day-to-day basis at the local level. Wisconsin also has several tribal child support agencies that administer the program for cases involving tribal members.

#### ***How Wisconsin Children and Families Get Connected to the Child Support Program***

Wisconsin's Child Support Program serves approximately 347,000 children. Families get connected to the program in a number of ways, including: referrals from public assistance programs; court orders created through divorce; and applications submitted by individuals outside of public assistance. The Child Support Program also establishes and enforces support orders when children are placed in out-of-home care by DCF.

#### ***Services Provided by County Child Support Agencies***

The Child Support Program is one of the most effective anti-poverty programs in the country.

County child support agencies provide a broad array of services that reduce childhood poverty rates, establish parental rights, ensure children have access to health care and promote the involvement of both parents in the lives of their children. This includes:

- Paternity Establishment
- Support Order Establishment and Enforcement
- Support order modification
- Health insurance establishment for children
- Collection of current support
- Collection of past-due support (arrear)
- Refer parents to Employment and Training programs, including Children First and ELEVATE
- Coordinate with other social service programs

#### ***The Impact of the Child Support Program on Wisconsin Children***

In 2021, Wisconsin's Child Support Program collected \$906 million in financial support, 98% of which went directly to Wisconsin children and families. Child support payments account for 42% of income for custodial families living in poverty<sup>1</sup>. The financial support provided to children because of the program helps put food on their tables, clothes in their closets and school supplies in their backpacks.

Children who receive child support are also:

- More likely to graduate high school
- Less likely to enter the criminal justice system
- Have fewer substantiated child protective services referrals

### ***The Impact of the Child Support Program on Parents***

County child support agencies work closely with programs across Wisconsin that administer employment and training opportunities for parents, such as WIOA and FSET. Child support agencies help custodial and non-custodial parents access educational resources and other needed services like Social Security.

### ***Program Funding***

County child support agencies are funded by a combination of federal, state and county dollars. In 2021, for every dollar spent on the program, \$6.43 in support was collected.

Currently, state GPR funding for local child support enforcement is set at \$10.7 million per year. Wisconsin receives a 66% federal match for state GPR investments in child support as well as incentive payments based on how well we perform compared to other states.

Governor Evers' proposed 2023-25 state budget would increase GPR funding for child support by \$5 million per year, which would draw down \$9.7 million in federal matching fund each year.

### ***Challenges Facing the Program and State Funding Needs***

The Federal Office of Child Support Enforcement issued guidance in June 2019 stating that recovery of birth cost expenses are no longer eligible to receive federal matching funds. This abrupt interpretation change occurred with little warning and will result in a loss of \$4.2 million per year in federal funding for Wisconsin county child support agencies.

Additionally, Wisconsin's Child Support program has begun to drop in the national rankings compared to other states, which could impact our federal incentive payments. The high number of cases per child support worker coupled with the increased complexity of cases and growing administrative requirements, such as e-filing and mandatory paternity testing, make it difficult for workers to devote the time needed to their cases.

An additional \$5 million in state GPR funding per year is necessary to help address these issues and to ensure that all Wisconsin children and families are receiving the economic support they need.
